Pete Wilson wins gold in Olympic double trap

BRITISH SHOOTER Pete Wilson joined the Team GB gold rush at the London Olympic Games, securing the gold medal in the double trap discipline on August 2. The current world record holder entered the final round of shooting with a score of 143 out of a possible 150.

A tense final round saw Wilson's lead drop to just one clay, but he showed great determination and discipline to maintain his lead, taking the gold medal by two clays over his nearest rival, Hakan Dahlby of Sweden. Russian shooter Vasily Mosin claimed the bronze medal.

This was Britain's first shooting medal at the Olympic Games since Richard Faulds took gold in the same discipline in Sydney in 2000. Faulds, like world number one Josh Richmond and reigning Olympic champion Walton Eller, both of the USA, failed to make the final this time.

Wilson's ambition was laid bare in an interview with Shooting Gazette in July, where he said: "I have been put on this planet solely to shoot and win at the Olympics. The only thing that matters to me is winning gold. It all comes down to just one day." However, Wilson revealed he had experienced a tricky run up to the final, saying "my training hadn't been fantastic, I wasn't overly pleased

with how I'd been shooting." His coach Sheikh Ahmed bin Mohammed bin Hasher Al Maktoum. double trap Olympic gold medallist in Athens 2004, ordered him to switch off his phone and not contact his family or girlfriend until he had secured the gold. Sheikh Ahmed told the BBC: "He wanted it so bad, but when you want something so bad sometimes you start thinking about losing it. I told him to separate himself from the world, switch his phone off, not talk to his family and friends. I told him 'those people aren't going to help you."

In an interview with the BBC shortly after his victory Wilson said: "It was an emotional roller coaster for me from start to finish. There are a lot of people I need to thank, mainly the British Shooting management and the National Lottery as without them I wouldn't be here. But I think most importantly, without a shadow of a doubt, Ahmed Al Maktoum, my coach. There is no doubt I would not be here today without him. I really don't know what to say. It's really weird to say that I'm an Olympic gold medallist!"
